- Consortium or the Standardisation of Influenza Seroepidemiology (CONSISE) is a global partnership aiming to standardize influenza seroepidemiology and develop comprehensive influenza investigation protocols to inform public health policy. http://consise.tghn.org/

- Data Management / Association for Data Management in the Tropics (ADMIT) is a public forum for clinical data managers engaged in non-commercial North-South collaborative research. After finishing my fellowship I had the opportunity to getting deeper in the Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs) arena.

Thanks to be part of one year of the Eisai Inc. team, I was chosen to work in a non-profit organization named *Drugs for Neglected Diseases Initiative* (DND*i*).

Eisai and DND*i* are currently developing a novel compound for chronic undetermined Chagas disease and a Phase II clinical trial is being conducted in Bolivia.

I was part of this team for more than six months working as a medical manager and clinical research associate (CRA).

This was such a wonderful and enricher experience, basically because I had the opportunity of giving to people more of the knowledge I have been acquiring; especially the things I learned during my fellowship.

Unfortunately and due to the fact that the sea is not always calm for us, those ones who work in research for the poverty, I was laid off.

But not all is bad news, I am also working as a consultant for the World Health Organization/Polio Eradication Initiative and I am monitoring a clinical trial in Cuba and I think this is just the beginning. I decided to start my own company: *Septentrional R&D*.

Now, I am using all my knowledge, experience and strength to give shape to this project. A project for life.

Perhaps now I had to open my eyes to other therapeutic areas different than NTDs, but always keeping in my mind and heart the poor people around the world.

Opportunities come in different ways and sometimes they look like problems, for that reason my friends do not be troubled if the future after your fellowship is not clear yet; you are being now empowered to be able to overcome challenges for the poorest people around the world and to overcome challenges in your own life.

TDR-GSK career development fellowship is a pathway for exciting work on clinical vaccine research

Current work

The experience at GSK led to an opportunity to work as project manager for a consortium undertaking a multi-Centre malaria vaccine trial. The consortium is made up of 8 Partners including Medical Research Unit at Albert Schweitzer Hospital (MRU-ASH) in Gabon, the Medical Research Council (MRC) Laboratories in The Gambia, Centre National de Recherche et de Formation sur le Paludisme (CNRFP) in Burkina Faso, Makerere University (MUK) in Uganda, University of Tübingen (UKT) in Germany, African Malaria Network Trust (AMANET) in Tanzania and Navrongo Heath Research Centre (NHRC) in Ghana with Statens Serum Institute (SSI) is the sponsor of the trial. European Malaria Vaccine Initiative (EMVI) left the partnership after one year and had contributed to the proposal development as well as the early phases of the trial. The objective of the project is to develop an efficacious malaria vaccine that is safe to be integrated into the Expanded Programme on Immunisation (EPI) within African countries. This is attempted through capacity building, networking & project management. The picture below shows some of the consortium members:



Lessons learnt from GSK

Working in cross cultural environments with both Francophone and Anglophone African countries as well as interacting with donors while at GSK was a practical on the job training for my current position. Work on the RTS'S program was very important learning as my current work is also in a consortium with multiple partners including Anglophone and Francophone African countries.

GSK training has been very relevant for our current work and key example are training in protocol development, communication, GCP, GCLP and monitoring. Other aspects like harmonization of methods and quality control have also been very important. It is this training that opened the door to this exciting work opportunity for me and many others who have been on the program. The fellowship is a proven means to increase the number of locals from developing countries contributing to the global cause of vaccines for better health.

Short-term grant for research capacity strengthening and knowledge management to help improve disease control

Request for applications Submission deadline: 12 May 2013

This new short-term grant scheme is designed to bridge strategic gaps in research capacity and knowledge management to help researchers and health professionals increase their contribution in addressing issues related to disease control.

Building on past investments in low- and middle-income countries (LMIC), the grant provides support to individuals or research teams to:

- expand their scope of knowledge and/or skills, and contribute to long-term achievements and sustainability of research efforts leading to health improvement
- address specific research capacity or knowledge management aspects that can advance the understanding, analysis and ways of finding solutions to public health problems

Support under this grant will be flexible, based on public health relevance, scientific quality and feasibility of the proposed expected output to be achieved within a period of one year.

The grant will not fund formal academic degree training, experimental studies or data collection involving human subjects or biological samples, or acquisition of skills not linked to a specific scientific output. In 2013 it is anticipated that 20-30 new grants (up to US\$ 50 000, non-renewed) will be awarded.

Proposals can be submitted in English, French, Spanish or Portuguese.

Funding Opportunity Announcement: Training Programs for Critical HIV Research Infrastructure for Low- and Middle-Income Country Institutions

National Institutes of Health, Fogarty International Center and National Institute of Mental Health

The purpose of this FOA is to encourage U.S. institutions with research collaborations at low-and middle-income country (LMIC) institutions to submit applications for training programs to strengthen the leadership and expertise in selected critical research infrastructure areas at their collaborating LMIC institutions. This FOA can only support training related to technical expertise, administration and financial management in support of one of these six areas:

- Dedicated research offices;
- Offices of research integrity;
- Ethics committees for protection of human subjects;

- Committees for animal care and use in research;
- Health sciences libraries (library and information science); and
- Information and communications technology systems (ICT) (expertise to keep these systems up-to-date and functioning)

Mentorship Scheme

The Global Health Network's Professional Membership Scheme continues to be a popular area of the network. There are a wide range of PMS members based across a range of countries and research professions Recently the annual review aspect of the scheme was activated so that members can record their accomplishments over the past twelve months and set career goals for the coming year. Many users; especially those in the early stages of building a career in clinical research, stated in their reviews that they receive very little career support and would benefit from having an experienced mentor.

Through focus groups, workshops, online questionnaires and individual interviews we asked a wider range of research staff what they needed to support them in taking part in research. The outcome was a call for access to access to pragmatic skills-training and a free mentoring scheme for potential and existing research staff, whatever their role within research.

In response to this demand we are currently pilot-testing a monitoring system using our existing network of experts and research staff who are active on The Global Health Network. There is a high demand for mentoring and currently we aim to pair one mentor with one mentee. To help with this process the Malaria Capacity Development Consortium (MCDC) has allowed us use of their excellent, fully interactive mentoring training tools for both mentors and mentees.

As a collective of experienced clinical researchers I wanted to take this opportunity to invite each of you to take part in this highly valuable mentoring scheme. Those willing to participate as a mentor would be required to sacrifice a small amount of their time to offer support and guidance to one mentee from the Professional Membership Scheme. The mentor and mentee are usually paired together based on their area of research and profession by the mentorship coordinator.
