

The Department of Health has announced that over £120 million of funding is to be awarded to 33 research units and groups, following a successful open research competition led by the National Institute of Health Research.

Part of the wider Official Developmental Assistance (ODA) budget, the aim of this research is to improve the health of patients and public in low and middle-income countries. Such research is vital to protect the UK at home. Disease knows no borders, and we are continually under threat from poorly understood infections and antimicrobial resistance.

The WHO Toolkit for the care and support of people affected by complications associated with Zika virus has been developed to serve as a model guide, with the goal of enhancing country preparedness for Zika virus outbreaks; the toolkit consists of three manuals.
